

Stylios Chronopoulos is Assistant Professor of Ancient Greek Philology at the University of Ioannina, Greece. Born in Athens in 1976, he studied Classical Philology at the National and Kapodistrian University of Athens, completed his doctorate at the University of Freiburg (2010) with a dissertation on personal mockery in Aristophanes' comedies and received his Habilitation from Freiburg in 2021 for his study of Pollux's *Onomasticon*, a second-century CE Greek thesaurus.

His research focuses on ancient Greek comedy, particularly Aristophanes, ancient lexicography and scholarship, and digital classics. He is fluent in English, French, and German and has held research and teaching positions at the University of Freiburg, the Heidelberg Academy of Sciences, the University of Crete, the University of Peloponnese, and, now, the University of Ioannina.

Chronopoulos has published extensively on Greek comedy and digital humanities, including the monograph *Spott im Drama* (2017) and numerous articles on Greek comedy, ancient lexicography, and digital scholarly editions. He has co-organized international conferences on digital classics and co-edited volumes on Greek comedy fragments and digital text analysis. His monograph on Pollux' *Onomasticon* is in print. His ongoing work includes a commentary on Diphilus' fragments for the series *Fragmenta Comica*, and contributions to digital analysis of drama.
